

MUSKEGON MUSEUM OF ART ORGANIZATIONAL HISTORY AND GOVERNING BOARD

History

At his death in 1905, lumber baron Charles H. Hackley, through a bequest to Muskegon Public Schools, established the **Hackley Picture Fund** to purchase “**pictures of the best kind**” for display in Hackley Public Library, which was owned and operated by the Board of Education.

By 1910, the Board of Education determined that the Library was not a suitable facility for these paintings and that a museum-quality facility should be built. Construction began in 1911 on a place for their growing art collection. Upon completion, the Board of Education chose to honor the inspiration for the project, naming their newest building the Hackley Art Gallery.

The Hackley Art Gallery was dedicated on June 21, 1912 to national and international notice, because it was the first building built in America in a city of 30,000 or less expressly to hold art.

The museum’s first director, Raymond Wyer, was a man of unique foresight who would lay a strong foundation for this outstanding art collection. The 12 directors who followed Wyer have continued to uphold the original charge to acquire “pictures of the best kind,” and the Muskegon Museum of Art, now in its 106th year, is nationally accredited and internationally recognized, fielding requests for the loan of works in the permanent collection on a regular basis.

In 1979, ground was broken for a \$1.6 million addition to the Hackley Art Gallery, funded by the L.C. & Margaret Walker Foundation. Construction was completed in 1980 and with that, the Hackley Art Gallery changed its name to the Muskegon Museum of Art.

In 1983, the Muskegon Museum of Art Foundation Board of Trustees was established at the conclusion of a successful community-wide fund drive to raise \$1,000,000, led by industrialist Robert Tuttle, leading to the creation of the first organizational endowment fund at the Community Foundation for Muskegon County.

After 102 years of ownership and four years of thoughtful planning by the School District and the MMA Foundation, the Board of Education for Muskegon Public Schools transferred the governance and ownership of the Museum and all its assets to the MMA Foundation, the 501(c)3 organization originally formed in 1984. The MMA Foundation is comprised of a volunteer board of 15 members, to which the Executive Director reports. To support the needs that were necessitated by this new chapter of this museum, the MMAF, in January of 2012, launched a \$7.5 million campaign, the largest capital campaign ever in Muskegon County. The MMA Foundation met its goals, having secured \$7.6M in gifts and pledges for endowment, facility improvements, and programming. The MMA is now in its sixth full year as an independent, self-funded museum.

Mission

The Muskegon Museum of Art, founded on a tradition of aesthetic excellence, is committed to fostering the life-long study and appreciation of the visual arts by strengthening, preserving, and exhibiting its collections; offering a wide range of traditional and contemporary exhibitions; stimulating learning and creativity through diverse public and educational programming; and enhancing community involvement and support in a safe, accessible, and welcoming environment.

Services

The Muskegon Museum of Art provides West Michigan access to a world-class collection of visual art - paintings, prints, sculpture and glass - enhanced by both a wide range of original exhibitions organized by the curatorial staff and by unique traveling exhibitions. Educational programs, including films, classes, family programs, lectures, hands-on activities, and docent-guided tours, provide a context for interpretation of the collection and make it accessible to diverse audiences. Our school outreach and tour program reaches over 5,000 area students and adults annually. Annual attendance is trending to over 30,000 per year. The Permanent Collection is renowned regionally, nationally, and internationally, with regular requests to borrow works coming from national and international museums.

Collaborations

The museum's collaborative efforts are on-going and have included shared projects with other Michigan museums, Grand Valley State University and other West Michigan colleges and universities, Muskegon Area Intermediate School District, Lakeshore Museum Center, West Michigan Symphony, Muskegon Civic Theatre, LST 393 Landing Ship Museum, Muskegon Area Arts and Humanities Festival Committee and the Pittsburgh Foundation. We are a founding member of Muskegon's Amazing Museums, a Muskegon County museum networking organization.

Constituents

Local and regional residents, as well as national and international tourists visit the Muskegon Museum of Art to experience the museum's collections, exhibitions and programs. The Museum is located in Muskegon County and is adjacent to the surrounding counties of Kent, Ottawa, Oceana, and Newaygo.

Staff

The MMA's group of 9 full-time and 19 part-time staff is strengthened by a corps of over 200 volunteers who contribute approximately 7,000 hours of service annually.

Accreditation

The Muskegon Museum of Art has been continuously accredited by the American Association of Museums since 1989.
